The findings from previous engagements influenced the approach for the High Falls State Park Framework Plan.



- Restore historic ecology and implement environmental stewardship practices.
- Ensure ongoing park maintenance and promote equitable access for surrounding neighborhoods to foster inclusivity.
- Apply universal design principles.
- Recognize that activity fees will limit accessibility.
- Preserve and highlight the cultural history of the Genesee River and integrate industrial relics.
- Share diverse stories reflecting the region's past and present.
- Enhance trail connections and promote multimodal transportation
- Provide access to the water's edge.
- Address parking and safety concerns.
- Encourage solitude-promoting activities like hiking and biking.
- Include a venue for community celebrations, while being cautious of excessive programming that may detract from the natural environment.

SITE HISTORY AND CULTURE

IT STARTS WITH THE RIVER

The site's rich history and contemporary allure all derive from the Genesee River and the Falls themselves. Programming and interpretation should begin with the these elements, and be both specific and appropriate to the site.

SENECA HERITAGE

High Falls is significant to the Seneca People, and offers opportunities for highlighting the historic and ongoing relationship of the Seneca to the Genesee River and native ecologies.

INDUSTRIAL HISTORY

High Falls is situated between a large scenic park and a downtown urban riverfront. This location sets the stage for High Falls to be a transitional and transformational part of the city and park system. The site features industrial relics from multiple eras, providing unique opportunities for storytelling and interpretation.

THE UNDERGROUND RAILROAD

Rochester was an active location along the underground railroad. For many freedom seekers Rochester was their final destinantion along the underground railroad where many people would then board ships on the Genesee River and cross the border into Canada.

LAYERS OF CULTURE

Rochester's history of industry and innovation is also one of the people who came to seek opportunity. The neighborhoods adjacent to High Falls State Park bear witness to the waves of migration that continue to shape the city's culture.

OLMSTED'S LEGACY

Rochester is one of the few cities in the U.S. with a park system envisioned by Frederick Law Olmsted, widely regarded as the father of American landscape architecture. His plans emphasized public health, social connection, and access to nature—principles that continue to shape how cities think about public space. Though not realized in his day, High Falls State Park can build on that legacy, reinforcing the idea that parks can reflect a city's values and contribute to its cultural identity.

1836

In the 1830s, Rochester was the center of industry in the area. Most notably, the falls powered thriving flour mills, leading to the city's nickname as "the Flour City".



The city experienced industrial growth with the establishment of various factories, including two cement factories, while wheat-processing shifted to the west. In the absence of wheat-processing, a burgeoning nursery business emerged, leading to the city being nicknamed "the Flower City."

1977

After the Civil War, the city experienced significant expansion on both sides of the river. During the post-war industrial boom, several businesses were established near High Falls, including Bausch + Lomb and Eastman Kodak. Clothing manufacturing, shoe manufacturing, brewing, and machine tool production industries began to flourish during this period.



In the 1880s, Rochester was growing rapidly, experiencing widespread social reforms, passenger rail, and building public parks as large local businesses owners like George Eastman donated land and money to the city's growth,



1900-1920

In the early 20th century, the canals around Rochester experienced major changes. In 1918, the Erie Canal was rerouted toallow for the Barge Canal construction. The abandoned canal bed was later developed and operated briefly between 1927 and 1956.

1947

By the 1950s, Rochester experienced significant population growth due to an influx of immigrants following World War II. This surge in arrivals, combined with industrialization, transformed the city into a prominent center for labor activism. In the 1960s, Rochester, like many other cities across the United States, began transitioning from urban living to suburban development.

SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS

DAWN TO DUSK OPERATION

Ensure that operations staff and parks police will be able to adequately staff and monitor the park.

LIGHTING

The urban, or street level portion of the park above the gorge will be well lit at night to ensure visibility for visitors and police.

PARKS POLICE

High Falls State Park will be patrolled by NYSOPRHP's Police, in coordination with the Rochester Police Department.

AN ACTIVE PARK IS A SAFE PARK

In the same way that "eyes on the street" deter crime in neighborhoods, "eyes on the park" will help deter crime here: it becomes much harder to conceal illicit activity.

EMERGENCY ACCESS AND EGRESS

High Falls State Park will comply with all applicable safety codes. This includes building safety and egress, as well as access to the park for fire, EMS, water rescue, and first responders.

WATER SAFETY

High Falls State Park is located between two significant waterfalls, High Falls and Lower Falls, and hydroelectric plants. For this reason, visitors will not be able to directly access the Genesee River. In addition, a water rescue plan will be developed in conjunction with the City of Rochester, and water rescue access points provided.



PHASING

Park phasing will be driven by the timelines of remediation and acquisition because the majority of High Falls State Park is former industrial land that is owned by others.



PHASE 1

Phase 1 focuses on the gorge immediately downstream of High Falls and improvements to High Falls Terrace Park.


PHASE 2

Phase 2 transforms the former industrial lands on the west side of the gorge and connects the park to the Browns Race district.

PHASE 3

Phase 3 completes High Falls State Park with the east side of the gorge and connections to the Genesee River Trail towards Lower Falls.
